Armies with hundreds of soldiers arrived in villages everywhere.


The villagers were forced to let the soldiers stay in their houses.

It was dangerous to travel anywhere.

Trade was difficult as goods were often stolen.

Shops were broken into, carts and waggons were taken or damaged and expensive tools were stolen.

Rose Mister of Tysoe, in Warwickshire, wrote that her husband was kidnapped on the way to market to sell corn. He was taken to Warwick castle and she had to pay a ransom to free him!






After the Parliamentarians won the war, they ordered every parish to write a list of everything that had been lost during the war because of the activities of the Parliamentarian army. Of course, in many places the King's armies had taken just as much.

Most ordinary people were not able to write, so these lists were very carefully written in books by local officials and submitted to Parliament.

People were sometimes paid for their losses, but this was very rare.





These 'loss accounts' show us the devastating effect that civil war had on ordinary people, just as it does today in places all around the world.

They also show us what kinds of things were valuable to people at this time.
