



This is a backfilled pond. The field is named 'Pond Field' in the Tithe Award. It was picked up on the geophys, but it was obscured by a modern service that is dug through it; this may well be a water pipe, tapping a former spring (see above and Fig.27 of the geophys report).

This is not an enclosure. The surviving earthworks do give that impression, but it is actually just the remains of a furlong, the linear features being boundaries that have survived better than those surrounding.

These are ponds. They are depicted on the First Edition OS map..



This is a former field boundary that defined a band of meadow along the northern bank of the dumble + R&F.

This is modern plantation woodland.

This is its continuation, which survives to present.

These are former field boundaries / headlands.

These are geological. They mirror the line of the river to the south and are the result of a slight fall in elevation towards the river and the exposure of a band of siltstone.

This is a former furlong boundary.

This is the combination of a former plough furrow and a former headland, giving the impression of a single feature.

This is its post-med rationalisation, i.e. the present-day boundary.
